Class Outline

9:30 a.m.	First-Aid for injuries that could occur while woodcarving.
9:45 a.m.	Review of all woodcarving safety rules and standards.
9:50 a.m.	A look at woodcarving tools including how to properly sharpen and care for them.
	You will learn and demonstrate how to make the following cuts: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pull (or paring) cut • Push cut • Score line • Stop cut
10:20 a.m.	A look at different woods for carving and how to select what you need.
10:30 a.m.	Project # 1- Complete a simple carving “in the round”.(An Indian canoe)
	Project # 2- Complete a simple low-relief carving. (An American flag)

Afternoon

12:15 p.m.	Clean up shop and evaluate.
12:30 p.m.	Meet rest of group on community logs (or in campsite if cookout).
1:00 p.m.	Lunch
2:00 p.m.	Totin’ Chip (Tool use and safety) will be offered for those who haven’t earned their certification. Totin’ Chip is required for the woodcarving merit badge.

This class is three hours long (and at least four hours if you need Totin’ Chip certification) so prepare yourself to be patient, ready to learn, and to have some fun so that you will have a couple of very nice wood carved projects at days end in addition to your official Scout Woodcarving Merit Badge and wallet card.
